BIOGRAPHIES OF THE TRAINERS



David Smith, PhD is Professor - Alec Nove Chair in Russian and East European Studies (previously Professor of Baltic History and Politics, 2008-2016) at the University of Glasgow. His research interests include nationalism, ethnic politics and the management of ethno-cultural diversity in Central and Eastern Europe, non-territorial autonomy, transnational minority activism and minority-kinstate relations.



Egdūnas Račius, PhD is a Professor of Middle Eastern and Islamic studies at Vytautas Magnus University in Kaunas. He is the Reviews Editor of the Journal of Muslims in Europe and a co-editor of the Yearbook of Muslims in Europe (both by Brill). His research interests encompass Eastern European Muslim communities and governance of religion (particularly Islam) in post-communist Europe.



Ivan Dodovski, PhD is a Professor in Critical Theory at University American College Skopje, and Dean of the UACS School of Political Science. His research interests include identity politics, multiculturalism, narratology, and contemporary drama.



Joanna Urszula Kurowska-Pysz, PhD is an Associate Professor and researcher at the Faculty of Applied Sciences at WSB University in Dąbrowa Górnicza. Her research interests include public governance, regional development, inter-organizational cooperation and territorial cooperation, including cross-border cooperation.



Marina Andeva, PhD is an Associate Professor in Political Science at University American College Skopje. She is also a Research Fellow at the Institute of International Sociology in Gorizia since 2009. Her research interests include migration, minority protection and cross-border cooperation.



Markku Suksi, PhD is Professor of Law at the Åbo Akademi University in Turku. His research interests include human rights, constitutionalism, comparative law, self-determination, territorial and non-territorial autonomy, elections and democratic governance.





Natalija Shikova, PhD is an Associate Professor of International Law at the Faculty of Law, International Balkan University in Skopje. Her research interests include non-territorial autonomy, self-determination, secession, human rights, inter-ethnic relations, confidence building measures, policymaking, strategic planning and impact assessments, EU integration, and democratization.



Robert Hudson, PhD is a Professor Emeritus of European History and Cultural Politics at the University of Derby. His research interests include French, Russian and South East European history, with a focus on inter-ethnic conflict, the politics of identity formation, and the representation of ethnic minorities in Europe.



Stipe Buzar, PhD is an Associate Professor at Libertas International University in Zagreb. His research interests include political philosophy, and ethics in international relations, the ethics of warfare and business ethics.



Tove H. Malloy, PhD is Professor of European Studies at Europa-Universität Flensburg, Germany and External Lecturer of International Studies at Roskilde University, Denmark. Her research interests include national minority rights, minority politics, territorial and non-territorial autonomy, protection of minorities during conflict and ethno-cultural empowerment.



Višeslav Raos, PhD is an Associate Professor of Comparative Politics at the Faculty of Political Science, University of Zagreb. His research interests include comparative European electoral and party politics, as well as processes of Europeanisation and democratization in post-communist Europe.
