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What is ENTAN?

ENTAN – the European Non-Territorial Autonomy Network is a COST Action (CA18114) aimed at examining the concept of non-territorial autonomy (NTA). ENTAN particularly focuses on NTA arrangements for reducing inter-ethnic tensions within a state and on the accommodation of the needs of different communities while preventing calls to separate state-hood.

The main objective of the network is to investigate existing NTA mechanisms and policies and to develop new modalities for the accommodation of differences in the context of growing challenges stemming from globalisation, regionalisation and European supranational integration. ENTAN fosters interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary group work, and provides for the training and empowerment of young researchers, academic conferences and publications, as well as for the dissemination of results to policy makers, civil society organisations and communities.

In the period 2019-2023, ENTAN has aimed at hosting meetings, conferences, and training schools,

alongside realising a number of publications and grants. In addition to this, it has created a miscellany of videos and promotional content, all of which are designed to develop a durable and adaptable foundation around the guestion of non-territorial autonomy, its practices and the frameworks in which they are situated. This body of work has been achieved by a network that has grown into an important collaborative platform which gathers more than 180 researchers from 36 countries and from various disciplines (law, political science, cultural studies, education, sociology, history, economy, language studies, and policy making). Through this collaboration, ENTAN hopes that it has constructed a reliable bedrock for approaching the concept of NTA and establishing a common understanding of various NTA modalities for the protection of minority rights and cultural diversity management across Europe and beyond.

Additionally, ENTAN has made it possible for the contact between experienced scholars and leading experts in the field of mi-

nority studies, including on the concept of non-territorial autonomy (NTA) on the one hand, and emerging talents and early career researchers who seek encouragement and supervision on the other hand. Furthermore, through Short-Term Scientific Missions, or STSMs, work group meetings and conference discussions, new collaborative links were established among researchers who have decided to work together and produce joint publications or knowledge exchange across regional or national borders or differences in age, gender, career stages, or disciplines. Moreover, the Action has provided for and maintained a high percentage of involvement of Inclusiveness Target Countries (ITC): 59% of all participating countries are ITC, and their representatives make for 61% of the MC membership, as well as 63% of the leadership positions within the Action. Lastly, ENTAN encourages the involvement of young researchers and innovators (YRIs) who make up 25% of the total Action participants.

Ultimately, in four and a half years (2019-2023), ENTAN has accomplished a variety of goals reflective of its fundamental premise. These achievements are detailed in the remainder of this report, categorised as Events, Publications, Grants, and Dissemination Products. We hope the effort put forth through these ample activities will inspire more valuable research down the line.

Working Groups

ENTAN, as a whole, gathers and organises a variety of scholars in four distinct groups:

Working Group 1:

Non-Territorial Autonomy: Legal and Political Aspects

This group prioritises interrogating current NTA models and practices. Their primary aim is to find the necessary tools to: 1) produce comparative research; and, 2) analyse and assess the ways in which NTA integrates with given legal and political frameworks. This is done with the goal of procuring the means for minorities to effectively partake in public life and decision-making.

Working Group 2:

Cultural Identities

This group consists of researchers in the fields of cultural studies, identity politics, socio-linguistics, arts, humanities and sociology. They work on inspecting current NTA models, from which they derive their function in conflict resolution and diversity-management.

Working Group 3:

Regional and Socio-economic Development: Incentives and Resources

This group considers the self-governing structures of ethno-cultural groups on a socioeconomic level. Meaning, that they investigate their economic incentives and resources thoroughly, with the aim of relating those incentives and resources to the structures' success in building inclusive democracies, social balance, and stable and prosperous societies.

Working Group 4:

A University Course in Non-Territorial Autonomy

This group, finally, gathers and synthesises the research produced by the previous three groups, with the intention of creating an NTA bibliography and useful teaching materials. The work done here is then used for the design and implementation of NTA in a university framework.








Action Core (AC) Meetings

The Action has held a total of six Action Core (AC) Meetings. The Core Group consists of Action Chair Ivan Dodovski, Action Vice Chair Robert Hudson, Marina Andeva, Hynek Böhm, Alexandra Ioannidou, Natalija Shikova, Aleksandar Pavlović, Noémia Bessa Vilela, Branko Bošković, Balázs Vizi, Börries Kuzmany, and David Smith.

The first AC meeting was held at the Institute for Philosophy and Social Theory in Belgrade on 22 November, 2019. The second one, due to the impact of COVID-19 and travel restrictions, was held online on 26 February 2021. The third was held at the Institute for Social Sciences, Budapest on 25 September 2021. The fourth was held online on 7 February 2022, and the fifth AC meeting was held at the University of Macedonia, Thessaloniki, on 11 October 2022. The sixth and final AC meeting was held in Ohrid, North Macedonia, on 24 June, 2023.

Management Committee (MC) Meetings

The Action has held a total of six Management Committee (MC) Meetings. Through a combination of on-site and online gatherings, these meetings have detailed all of ENTAN's achievements and proceedings throughout its individual Grant Periods.

The opening meeting of the Management Committee was held in Brussels on 28 February, 2019. This was followed by five additional meetings. The second meeting was held in Skopje, North Macedonia on 6 June 2019. The third, although initially planned to be hosted in Porto, Portugal, due to travel restrictions, was held online on 22 May 2020. Due to the same travel restrictions, the fourth MC meeting was held online on 28 October 2021. Following that, ENTAN held its fifth meeting of the Management Committee in a hybrid mode in Constanța, Romania on 12 May 2022. Finally, ENTAN held its sixth and final meeting online on 30 June, 2023.




During the course of the Action, there were 187 posts in total. The average reach of the post was 118.49 and the average number of likes and reactions was 16.21 per post. The highest reach was achieved for the post related to grants offered by ENTAN and it was 1,597. The other posts which achieved the highest reach were related to: The Second ENTAN Training School (1,184), the Second ENTAN Conference (951), the Third ENTAN Training School (679). The posts which achieved the highest number of likes and reactions were related to: The Second ENTAN Conference (44), the Second ENTAN Training School (38), the ENTAN Forum (33), the Third ENTAN Training School (30).

Twitter

During the course of the Action, there was a total of 195 tweets published. The average impression of the tweet was 36.14 and the average number of engagement was 6.41. The highest number of impressions were related to the tweet on the Third ENTAN Training School and it was 408. Other tweets with significant number of impressions were related to: ENTAN Forum (381), Webinar "Silenced minority languages: Folk tales, songs (France, Greece)" (267), the Second ENTAN Conference (251). Tweets which achieved the highest number of engagements were related to: The Third ENTAN Training School (32), ENTAN Forum (29), the Second ENTAN Conference (27). Other tweets which were the most popular within the public were related to activities conducted during the project and refer to: publishing, grants offering and awarding, including individual achievements, meetings and other activities related to the topic of non-territorial autonomy.


YouTube




Graph 2. ENTAN communication and dissemination in numbers
